Alf came to Australia as a child migrant from Malta. I first met Lee when Alf brought her down to Tuart Place for a gathering we had. It was good to meet her, as he spoke very fondly of her. Alf liked his visits to Tuart Place to catch up with fellow child migrants from all institutions. He loved to participate in our social gatherings or events that were put on. He came to our ten-pin bowling morning we had at Melville.

Alf was a great contributor at our sausage sizzles at Bunnings and will be fondly remembered whenever we have our next one. Last January, as ill as he

was, he made sure to come and give a hand. Such a special person to think of others and to help out whenever he could. His presence was very much appreciated on the day.

Alf also donated two sewing machines to Tuart Place. Anything to do with sewing machines was Alf's expertise. The first machine was a gift to the Craft Ladies, which was received with thanks. The second sewing machine was donated to Tuart Place as a prize for the Xmas in July raffle last year. Susy won it, but donated it to Lou-Lou, who was overjoyed with the gift.

It was such a shock when we heard that Alf had become seriously ill. I did go to visit him at the Murdoch Hospital. He was his usual chirpy self, as ill as he was.

Lee, I am so sorry for your loss, I am sure Alf will be missed not only by you, but his family as well. May I say how very privileged it was to have met Alf. His kindness knew no bounds, as he was always willing to help wherever he could.

Future Pathways is funded by the Scottish Government to provide support to people who experienced abuse or neglect while they were in care in a Scottish institution. The scheme seeks to improve the day to day quality of the individual's lifestyle. Natalie Tonking, Admin Assistant at Tuart Place, has helped more than 15 people to access a wide range of support which has included items such as purchasing a fridge; an iphone; Birthlink family tracing in the UK; airline tickets to visit grandchildren; a new hot water system; concrete a driveway and purchasing a tip-up chair to make getting up easier. The scheme has just been extended for another few years.

"Natalie is always nice to talk to and has been a life line with helping get me help from Future Pathways by doing all the electronic communication, sending emails and passing on messages as well as chasing up providers for me when I was in hospital. Alistair from Future Pathways, with his distinct Scottish accent has been a dear and rings regularly to check on me and seems to enjoy a chat. He has helped to fund the installation of railings in my laundry and to replace my very old bed with a comfortable new one.
