eventually moved to the Eastern States. I now live in Hadfield in Victoria and have a lovely wife children and grandchildren and even great grand-children. I am now 76 and can say I am happy.

Sheilagh was one of the older girls when I was at St. Joseph's orphanage. I had heard of her, but had little time with her, as she was older and had her own friends.

I really got to know Sheilagh when in the late nineties, her husband suggested to her, how great it would be if the child migrants who came out in 1947 had an anniversary trip back to their homelands. I had known about this for a while and was surprised a few weeks later when she told us younger girls would be going as well.

Sheilagh did a lot of work for us girls. Arranging cake stalls and raffles with the help of the nuns. Our sentimental journey send off from the Perth Airport was amazing, with a few of the nuns and the Archbishop coming to see us off on a trip of a lifetime.

On arrival in England we were greeted by the press and were a wonder to the locals, who never knew that their country could do such a thing. We had Sister Leonie, who came on the trip with us. The girls opened her eyes with some of the stories told. I'm sure she had a good time as well.

Sheilagh used to live in Mandurah and my partner Stan and I would often call to see her when we went to visit Stan's son, who also lived in Mandurah. I was shocked that on her passing to learn that she had lived in Bassendean for a few years before passing.

Sheilagh, you were a wonderful person and will never be forgotten by her friends from St.Joseph's orphanage. I'm not too sure if I ever thanked you for your kindness to us girls over the years. So with my thanks for your good deeds and kindness, rest in peace from a grateful St.Joey's girl.
